Lucie Sovová obtained her PhD at Wageningen University with a thesis exploring the diverse food economies of Czech urban gardeners. This presentation draws on a recent paper co-authored with Esther Veen.

This webinar opens a debate on geopolitical bias in sustainable food system scholarship. We explore the topic using the case of urban gardening. Urban gardeners in Western contexts are presumed to hold activist motivations conducive for the food system's transformation, while in less affluent contexts urban gardening is framed as a subsistence-driven practice. In contrast, a comparative study of allotment gardeners in Brno, Czechia and Utrecht, the Netherlands suggest that in both contexts urban gardening is performed and understood in similar ways. You will be able to discuss Lucie Sovová's contention that scholarship on the food system's sustainability needs to incorporate knowledge from a greater diversity of places, actors and motivations.
